Fisheries (South Island Customary Fishing) Regulations 1999

Notification of Wairewa/Lake Forsyth Mātaimai Reserve and Appointment of Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki (No. F543)

Pursuant to Regulation 22 of the Fisheries (South Island Customary Fishing) Regulations 1999, the Chief Executive of the Ministry of Fisheries gives the following notice:

Pursuant to Regulation 20, by a notice published in the *New Zealand Gazette*, 10 June 2010, No. 64, page 1849, the Minister of Fisheries and Aquaculture declared a mātaimai reserve over all fisheries waters of Lake Forsyth and outlet that flows into the sea and the Takiritawai River that flows into the northern end of Lake Forsyth, excluding any other river or stream or tributary that flows into or from any of these fisheries waters.

A mātaimai reserve is an identified traditional fishing ground in South Island fisheries waters established for the purpose of customary food gathering.

The Minister of Fisheries and Aquaculture, in an instrument dated on the 31st day of May 2010, appointed Charlie Zimmerman, Iaeen Cranwell, John Boyles, Rei Simon, Robin Wybrow and Theo Bunker as Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki for the mātaimai reserve.

The appointment is for a term of five years.

The mātaimai reserve and appointment of Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki take effect from **8 July 2010**.

Commercial fishing within the mātaimai reserve is prohibited under Regulation 24(2) of the Fisheries (South Island Customary Fishing) Regulations 1999.

The Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki may authorise any individual to take fish, aquatic life or seaweed for customary food gathering purposes from within the whole or any part of the mātaimai reserve.

No fishing for customary food gathering purposes may take place in the mātaimai reserve without authorisation from the Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki.

Notification of Oreti Mātaimai Reserve and Appointment of Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki (No. F544)

Pursuant to Regulation 22 of the Fisheries (South Island Customary Fishing) Regulations 1999, the Chief Executive of the Ministry of Fisheries gives the following notice:

Pursuant to Regulation 20, by a notice published in the *New Zealand Gazette*, 10 June 2010, No. 64, page 1849, the Minister of Fisheries and Aquaculture declared a mātaimai reserve over the fisheries waters along Oreti Beach between

the Waimatuku River and the New River Estuary, west of Invercargill.

The Minister of Fisheries and Aquaculture, in an instrument dated on the 31st day of May 2010, appointed Michael Richard Skerrett and Cyril Raymond Gilroy as Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki for the mātaaitai reserve.

The appointment is for a term of five years.

The mātaaitai reserve and appointment of Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki take effect from **8 July 2010**.

The Oreti Mātaaitai Reserve includes all fisheries waters along Oreti Beach lying inside a line:

- (a) commencing at a point on the mean high water mark (MHW) at the Waimatuku River at 46°21.47'S and 168°08.98'E; then
- (b) proceeding in a straight line generally in a south-easterly direction for approximately 1.5 nautical miles to a point 0.5 nautical miles offshore from MHW at 46°22.79'S and 168°09.85'E; then
- (c) proceeding generally in a south-easterly direction following that 0.5 nautical mile mark to a point offshore at 46°30.31'S and 168°15.60'E; then
- (d) proceeding generally in a north-easterly direction to a point on the MHW at the New River Estuary at 46°30.02'S and 168°16.50'E; and then
- (e) proceeding along the MHW to the point of commencement.

Commercial fishing within the mātaaitai reserve is prohibited under Regulation 24(2) of the Fisheries (South Island Customary Fishing) Regulations 1999.

The Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki may authorise any individual to take fish, aquatic life or seaweed for customary food gathering purposes from within the whole or any part of the mātaaitai reserve.

No fishing for customary food gathering purposes may take place in the mātaaitai reserve without authorisation from the Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki.

Notification of Horomamae Mātaaitai Reserve and Appointment of Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki (No. F545)

Pursuant to Regulation 22 of the Fisheries (South Island Customary Fishing) Regulations 1999, the Chief Executive of the Ministry of Fisheries gives the following notice:

Pursuant to Regulation 20, by a notice published in the *New Zealand Gazette*, 10 June 2010, No. 64, page 1850, the Minister of Fisheries and Aquaculture declared a mātaaitai reserve over the fisheries waters to the north and northeast of Horomamae (Owen) Island, on the east side of Stewart Island.

The Minister of Fisheries and Aquaculture, in an instrument dated on the 31st day of May 2010, appointed Rodney Ryan, James Arthur Sinclair Ryan and Phillip Lindsay Ryan as Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki for the mātaaitai reserve.

The appointment is for a term of five years.

The mātaaitai reserve and appointment of Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki take effect from **8 July 2010**.

The Horomamae Mātaaitai Reserve includes all New Zealand fisheries waters enclosed by a line:

- (a) commencing on the north-west side of Horomamae Island on the mean high water mark (MHW) at 47°07.38'S and 168°08.93'E; then

- (b) proceeding in a straight line in a northerly direction to a point offshore at 47°07.10'S and 168°08.89'E; then
- (c) proceeding in a straight line in an easterly direction to a point offshore at 47°07.08'S and 168°09.25'E; then
- (d) proceeding in a straight line in a southerly direction to a point offshore at 47°07.35'S and 168°09.44'E; then
- (e) proceeding in a straight line in a south-easterly direction to a point offshore at 47°07.43'S and 168°09.65'E; then
- (f) proceeding in a straight line in a south-westerly direction to a point on the north-east side of Horomamae Island, on the MHW at 47°07.47'S and 168°09.60'E; and then
- (g) proceeding in a generally north-westerly direction along the MHW to the point of commencement.

Commercial fishing within the mātaaitai reserve is prohibited under Regulation 24(2) of the Fisheries (South Island Customary Fishing) Regulations 1999.

The Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki may authorise any individual to take fish, aquatic life or seaweed for customary food gathering purposes from within the whole or any part of the mātaaitai reserve.

No fishing for customary food gathering purposes may take place in the mātaaitai reserve without authorisation from the Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki.

Notification of Pikomamaku Mātaaitai Reserve and Appointment of Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki (No. 546)

Pursuant to Regulation 22 of the Fisheries (South Island Customary Fishing) Regulations 1999, the Chief Executive of the Ministry of Fisheries gives the following notice:

Pursuant to Regulation 20, by a notice published in the *New Zealand Gazette*, 10 June 2010, No. 64, page 1850, the Minister of Fisheries and Aquaculture declared a mātaaitai reserve over fisheries waters to the north and southwest of Pikomamaku (Womens Island), on the east side of Stewart Island.

The Minister of Fisheries and Aquaculture, in an instrument dated on the 31st day of May 2010, appointed Graeme Metzger and Michael Stevens as Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki for the mātaaitai reserve.

The appointment is for a term of five years.

The mātaaitai reserve and appointment of Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki take effect on **8 July 2010**.

The Pikomamaku Mātaaitai Reserve consists of two separate areas described as follows:

Area 1: All that area of New Zealand fisheries waters enclosed by a line which at every point is along the mean high water mark (MHW) and within the gulch way (channel) between the north side of Pikomamaku (Womens Island) and the adjacent islet. Area 1 is approximately 0.002 square kilometres (110 metres long and 30 metres wide at the widest point).

Area 2: All that area of New Zealand fisheries waters, approximately 0.04 square kilometres, along the south-west side of Pikomamaku enclosed by a line:

- (a) commencing on the MHW on the southern tip of Pikomamaku at 46°49.52'S and 168°14.69'E; then

- (b) proceeding due south to a point 150 metres offshore from the point of commencement; then
- (c) proceeding in a generally north-westerly direction along a line which at every point is 150 metres offshore from the MHW to a point due west of the northern entrance to Water Well Bay (the 46°49.44'S line of latitude); then
- (d) proceeding due east to a point on the MHW on the northern entrance to Water Well Bay at 46°49.44'S and 168°14.64'E; and then
- (e) proceeding in a generally south-easterly direction along the MHW to the point of commencement.

Commercial fishing within the mātaihai reserve is prohibited under Regulation 24(2) of the Fisheries (South Island Customary Fishing) Regulations 1999.

The Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki may authorise any individual to take fish, aquatic life or seaweed for customary food gathering purposes from within the whole or any part of the mātaihai reserve.

No fishing for customary food gathering purposes may take place in the mātaihai reserve without authorisation from the Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki.

Notification of Kaihuka Mātaihai Reserve and Appointment of Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki (No. F547)

Pursuant to Regulation 22 of the Fisheries (South Island Customary Fishing) Regulations 1999, the Chief Executive of the Ministry of Fisheries gives the following notice:

Pursuant to Regulation 20, by a notice published in the *New Zealand Gazette*, 10 June 2010, No. 64, page 1851, the Minister of Fisheries and Aquaculture declared a mātaihai reserve over the fisheries waters around Kaihuka Island (within the Breaksea Islands group), on the east side of Stewart Island.

The Minister of Fisheries and Aquaculture, in an instrument dated on the 31st day of May 2010, appointed Gail Thompson as Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki for the mātaihai reserve.

The appointment is for a term of five years.

The mātaihai reserve and appointment of Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki take effect from **8 July 2010**.

The Kaihuka Mātaihai Reserve includes all New Zealand fisheries waters enclosed by a line surrounding Kaihuka Island which at every point is 50 metres offshore from the mean high water mark.

Commercial fishing within the mātaihai reserve is prohibited under Regulation 24(2) of the Fisheries (South Island Customary Fishing) Regulations 1999.

The Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki may authorise any individual to take fish, aquatic life or seaweed for customary food gathering purposes from within the whole or any part of the mātaihai reserve.

No fishing for customary food gathering purposes may take place in the mātaihai reserve without authorisation from the Tangata Tiaki/Kaitiaki.
